## Scholar and Teacher

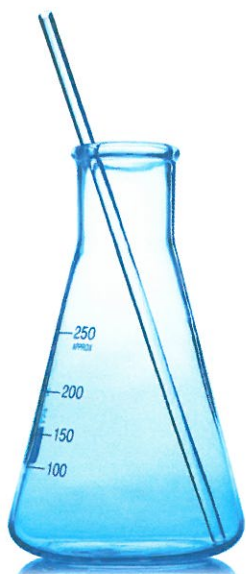

### Only at Rutgers

■ The Rutgers University Cell and DNA Repository is the largest university-based repository of its kind in the world. The repository, led by geneticist Jay Tischfield, is a key international center for the study of genetics and autism, mental health, drug abuse, alcoholism, diabetes, and digestive and kidney diseases.

■ Directed by chemist Helen Berman, the Protein Data Bank is the single worldwide repository for three-dimensional protein structures. Scientists around the globe use the free, online library to study, store, and share molecular information as they hunt for new medical and drug therapies.

■ Under the guidance of Dean John J. Farmer Jr., the School of Law–Newark's *Rutgers Law Review* published "A New Type of War," an online monograph of logs, audiotapes, transcripts, and radar data of the flights of 9/11. In its first few days of publication, the site logged 7 million visits from 173 different countries.

The Council for Advancement and Support of Education and the Carnegie Foundation bestow the annual awards on a single professor in each state who has an outstanding impact on undergraduates. Past Rutgers winners include Barry Qualls (2006), Stephen Greenfield (2004), and Clement Alexander Price (1999).

Rutgers employs more than 13,000 full- and part-time faculty and staff on its three regional campuses. 99 percent of full-time faculty hold a Ph.D. or other terminal degree.

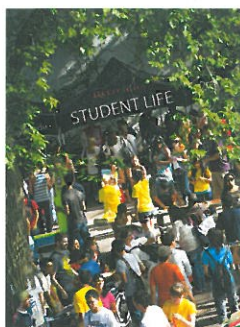

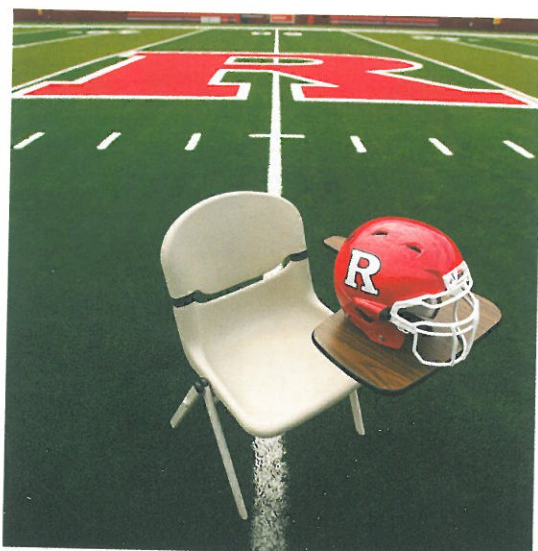

For the fourth consecutive year, the Rutgers football team ranks in the top three nationally in the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate (APR), becoming the only university in the nation to earn such a prestigious honor. For the fourth straight year, Rutgers has the best APR mark of any state university in the nation.

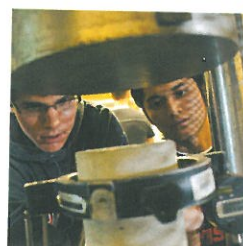

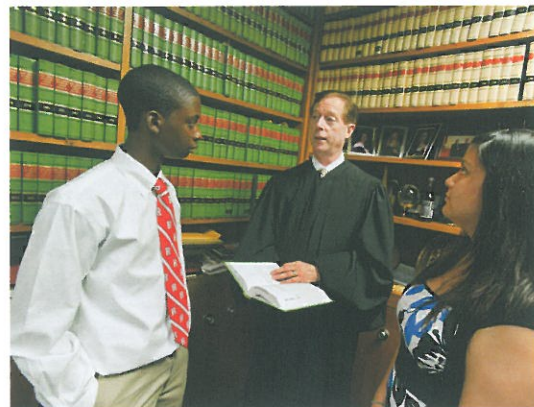

## Rutgers Future Scholars: Pathway to College Success

Some 800 middle school and high school students from Rutgers' hometowns are aiming for the top through the Rutgers Future Scholars Program. Unique in the nation, the program identifies academically promising 7th graders from financially disadvantaged backgrounds and gives them five years of intensive, year-round precollege support. Students who complete the program and are accepted at Rutgers attend the university tuition-free. The program to date has a 0 percent high school dropout rate.

**North America** Rutgers medical anthropologist Peter Guarnaccia studies community health in Oaxaca, Mexico, and New Brunswick, New Jersey—home to Rutgers' flagship campus and to many Oaxacan immigrants. Capitalizing on this unique demographic, Rutgers takes a creative, holistic approach to improving the lives of people who reside in our hometown and more than 3,000 miles away. 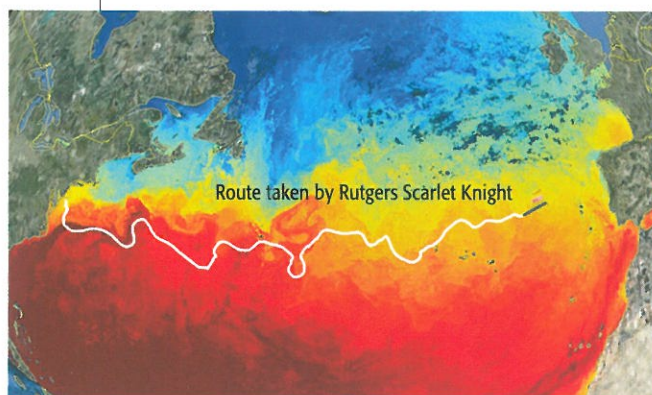

The USAID program's goal: ensure that emerging "Liberia is better equipped to meet its key development challenges."

**Asia** Our International Executive MBA (IEMBA) brings the excellence of Rutgers Business School to Shanghai, Beijing, and Singapore. The same faculty of our U.S. EMBA program—globally ranked #5 in strategy and #6 in finance by *BusinessWeek*—travel to our Asian locales to teach IEMBA courses.

**Europe** The Large Hadron Collider (LHC) in Switzerland is changing fundamental physics by revealing nature's most basic subatomic particles—the building blocks of all things—and Rutgers is at the forefront of the research. Our physicists are contributing crucial hardware for the LHC and will analyze the wealth of new data the collider will produce.

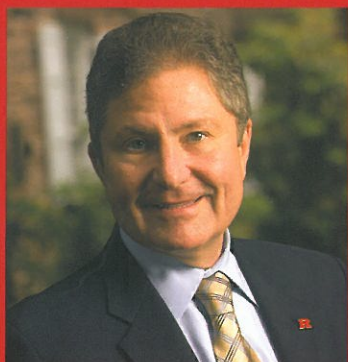

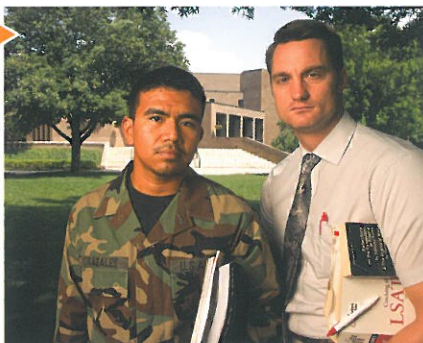

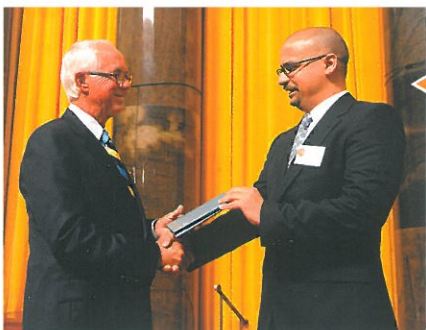

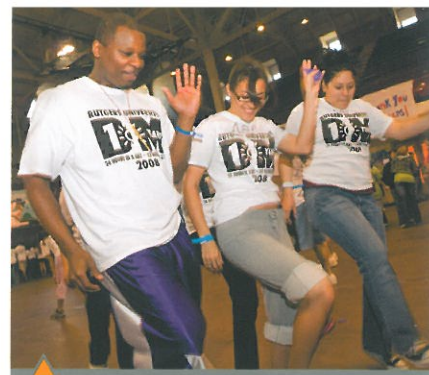

## Financial Aid/Scholarships

Financial aid, ranging from \$500 to \$24,000, was offered to 73 percent of the 2010-2011 entering class; the average aid package was \$16,000. In total, 86 percent of all undergraduates received need-based financial aid. Rutgers granted an additional \$15.8 million in merit scholarships.
